Norbert Campbell is an Industrial Hygienist and a Public Health Inspector with over 30 years' experience practicing OSH in Jamaica. Most of those years he served in the OSH programme of the Ministry of Health, where he became head of the programme. Norbert's contribution to the development of OSH in Jamaica includes being a member of the team that developed the suite of OESH programmes at the UWI and became its founding Coordinator/Lecturer; assisting in the development of the BSc. Degree in OSH at the UTech; and chairing the multi-partite committee which revised and piloted the National Insurance

(NIS) injury benefits claim form that is in current use. He has also contributed to OSH in the region having served on CARICOM's Expert Panel on Workers' Health; as Facilitator for the PAHO/Government of Trinidad and Tobago Workshop on OSH in Healthcare Settings; and as a presenter on Jamaica's Country Report on Workers' Health at the PAHO/ILO regional conference on workers' health.

Mr. Campbell is currently a Lecturer in the Department of Community Health and Psychiatry at the UWI and teaches OSH in graduate and undergraduate programmes. He has a BHSc. degree from the University of Technology, a graduate Certificate in Industrial Hygiene from the Gage OSH Institute of the University of Toronto; a MPH degree from the UWI, with a practicum attachment with the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health (USA), and is currently a PhD candidate in the OESH programme of the UWI.

A founding member of JOHSPA, Norbert is currently the Honorary Secretary, and has served as the Association's President and Vice President twice, as well as Deputy Chair of the Steering Committee that led to its formation as an Association. He is also a member of the American Conference of Governmental Industrial Hygienists (ACGIH) and a member, and a former technical advisor, of the National Environmental Health Association of the USA.

Mr. Campbell is passionate about the improvement of OSH for Jamaican workers and strongly believes that JOHSPA has a signal role to play in such an effort.
